Wow, we sure have some generous people in our club. *Thank you for your support!*





Builders Corner

Just a "Flivver" - Now in Don Ahrens possession.

Defined as an "old battered car" by many. This HCR build came from a combination of the Star of Milwaukee", the 1908 Sears Model G" and a picture in an old Mechanics Illustrated Magazine, possibly a Jimmy Woods.

The build began 15 or 20 years ago with soap stone lines on the garage floor. The square tubing is a bit bigger with a thicker wall, GM Diesel wrist pins and CAT bolts make the king pins and bosses. Two Chicago Rawhide seals and blue silicone sealer allows a transfer case from an old lawn tractor to stand up and accept power from a thirteen horse Honda horizontal engine. The tapered end of the crankshaft was removed. Two transaxles from derelict old lawn tractors: 5 forwards + N + R which was shifted in a straight line, and 3 + R, in an "H" pattern. An intermediate "jack shaft" between the engine and transaxle made adjusting pulley sizes easier, without needing too large a pulley, in any one place. 3 speed and brakes are for go-karts by Northern. Discs



are welded to Tractor Supply sprocket hubs and calipers activated by rods with adjusting clevises on the ends.

The final drive sprockets are welded to the wheel hubs and a stub extends the transaxle shaft to proper width to match axle width. A collar with a keyway in it was cut from a tractor drive wheel and welded to a stub shaft.

Clutch action is by a belt tightener. An idler mounted on a swing arm is pulled up by a cable hooked to a handle by the left side of seat. The brakes are activated by the long handle outside of clutch handle. The steering tiller rides in "Jimmy Diesel" (71- series) blower bearings, mounted in oak blocks bored to fit. The axle nuts are cotter-keyed through holes drilled in the "Cat" bolts. A #40 drive chain is used.

After Ted's passing in July, the family contacted Don to "place" the Flivver in good hands and under his care as the new owner. A trip to Springfield IL would be



"happening" to pick up the Flivver and take possession so miles were traveled in the van in hopes of taking it apart and getting it all here easily. After discovering it would need a trailer, \$380 purchase of lumber (to build a protective box) and a trailer hitch for

the van, the journey to AZ was accomplished. Upon arrival and assessment, a pulley and "kill" switch were needed. Don was getting too old for jumping off the Flivver to raise the hood to stop the car before it ran into the garage wall. We've had the pleasure of seeing it on Halloween weekend and hope to see it in March at the Cross Church cruise in.

A shy unspoken Don Ahrens was brought out of his shell by Ted Clark the owner and builder of this Flivver. Sadly, Ted got Don started at pulling tricks on colleagues to bring him out of his shyness. Not sure it was a healthy change in Don Ahrens but we love him anyway. (Smile)
