Those responsible for shop operations will be working to make this a smooth transition.



Denny Lockmon's 1964 Studebaker Avanti

In April 1974, when Denny already had two Avanti's in his garage he spotted a 1964 Avanti for sale by a family in the Chicago area. He paid a premium for the car and has owned it ever since. He drove it regularly in Nebraska, Colorado, Indiana and other temperate environments. (It did not come with air conditioning) The car is extremely original although it was repainted the original Avanti Red in 2017, the carb was rebuilt in 2020 and the wheels are Boranni wires that were an option on some 1970 models. Recently some german headlights were added so as to brighten up the night vision. Denny, who is on the board of directors of the Avanti Association of America, is a humble expert on all things Avanti. His car was featured in the 2010 and 2019 Avanti Owners Association International calendar and has also won best in show.

The original story of the Avanti is quite interesting. It started with the appointment of a former McCullough executive as president of the Studebaker Packard Corporation in February 1961. On a business trip that year from Chicago to California he bought all the car

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magazines he could find at the airport and began sketching a design for a new car. The sketches were handed over to Studebaker's design team.



In just 10 days a team of designers hid away in a rented house in the Mojave Desert just outside Palm Springs, California produced the design, code named "X-SHE". Incredibly, within a week the four designers had developed a 1/8-scale clay model of the proposed car. The head of design immediately returned to snowy South Bend factory with the model and presented it to the new president.

In 1963 3,834 Avanti's were produced and in 1964 production was limited to 809 by the termination and shut down of auto production in Studebaker's South Bend facilities. The all fiberglass Avanti was marketed as "America's high-performance 4-passenger luxury car." The original 1963 and 1964 Avantis came in \$4,445 R-1, \$4,655 R-2 and \$5,665 R-3 forms. The Avanti was powered by Studebaker's most potent engine, the "Jet Thrust" 289CI V-8. The engine featured solid lifters, a four-barrel Carter AFB carburetor, a dual-point distributor and dual exhausts. In base form the engine produced 240hp at 5,000 RPM. The automatic transmission-equipped car went from 0 to 60 MPH in 8.6 seconds and on to a 115 MPH top speed.





The interior features a wrap around instrument cluster inspired by an aircraft cockpit and aircraft style knobs for controls. The 289CI engine and dual exhaust produces a tone as unique as a lion's growl.

The Avanti was resurrected several times between 1964 and 1991 by several folks using parts supplied by other manufacturers.

Big Bird - Ron & Roxie's 1962 Ford Thunderbird





The Ford Thunderbird or T-Bird is a personal luxury car produced starting in 1955 to compete with the Corvette. Ron and Roxie's car was part of the third generation of T-Birds. It is a 1962 T-Bird in Venetian Red with matching interior.





The engine is a 390 cubic inch V8. The odometer reads 04184.6. The car features power steering and brakes, a Cruise-o-matic transmission with a 3:00-1 axle, AM radio and the swing away steering wheel affectionately referred to as the fat man steering wheel.

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Interestingly, Ford held a contest to name the car with the prize being a \$250 suit. The winner of the contest did not want the suit and bought a \$95 suit and extra pair of trousers from Saks 5^{th} Avenue with the money.

Big Bird was acquired from Bud Heintz, a founding member of VVSC. This was his project car. When Ron and Roxie first approached Bud about buying it, they arranged for a test drive. Even though they determined Big Bird needed more work they decided it was too beautiful not to buy. So, they bought it. Since they already have a couple of collector cars, this may not have been their smartest decision according to Ron. Big Bird was registered as an Arizona historic vehicle, but because Ron and Roxie are Minnesota residents, it is currently registered as a Minnesota collector car.

Because of health issues they have it listed for sale on the VVSC website. More details are in the 'For Sale or Wanted' pages of the website.

1931 Lincoln Model K Tourer with John Wayne and Constance Cummings

The guiding hand of the Lincoln Model K was Edsel Ford. The model K was only produced for one year. It had a new 145-inch-wheelbase chassis with a drop-frame design using massive channel section structure with six heavy cross members. Bodies were mounted on brackets on the outside of the frame, below the top of the chassis rail. A revised Model L V-8 engine was used, but it was tweaked primarily by increased carburetion to produce 120hp at 2,900 rpm.

1931 Duesenberg Model J Derham Tourer with Gary Cooper

The Model J utilized a 419 cubic inch Lycoming Duesenberg straight 8 with dual overhead cams and four valves per cylinder. The engine produced 265 BHP and 374 Ft Lbs of torque which propelled the 5,291 car to a top speed of 116 MPH using a Warner three speed manual transmission. A total of 8 of these cars were made and one of those was sold in 2016 for \$1,320,000.

Recipes



Tobey's Prize Flank Steak from Jane Fast

Ingredients

- 1. 1 ½ teaspoons of salt
- 2. 3 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 3. 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 4. 1 tablespoon Worchester sauce
- 5. Fresh ground pepper to taste
- 6. Garlic salt to taste
- 7. 1 to 1 ½ pounds flank steak
- 8. 1 large onion, sliced in rings

Cooking Instructions

- A. Combine first six ingredients and mix
- B. Put flank steak in container that can be covered and pour mixture from A over both sides of flank steak
- C. Cover flank steak with rings of onion and marinate in closed container overnight in the fridge
- D. Remove onion rings and enough marinade to make it easy to grill
- E. Preheat grill to 350 degrees and grill for six minutes on each side
- F. Slice the steak thin on the diagonal

Trivia Answers³

- 1. Answer A: Chrysler stood out from the pack in the '50s when they became the first auto maker in over a decade to offer air conditioning with the '53 Imperial. By 1960, car buyers had caught on to the brilliance of auto air conditioning, and the feature could be found in around 1 in 5 new cars.
- 2. Answer C: The iconic Chevy Corvette came out in 1953. Early versions of this two-door convertible -- which took its name from a small warship -- were available in blue, red, black or white.
- 3. Answer B: The Ford Thunderbird personal luxury vehicle was a sporty two-seater when it came out in 1957. The company took a gamble in 1958 by adding a back seat, and the change paid off with more than 200,000 units sold over the next three years.
- 4. Answer D: The '50s Ford Fairlane was a full-sized vehicle famous for its shiny chrome accents. Named for Ford's Fair Lane estate in Dearborn, Michigan, the car had a characteristic Fairline Stripe that gave it a stylish two-tone finish.
- 5. Answer D: Some states had enacted laws before, but surprisingly, lap belts weren't required by federal law until 1964, shoulder belts until 1968 and integrated shoulder/lap belts until 1974. Rising traffic fatalities about 50,000 a year in the U.S. at the time made them a necessity. Even though there are more drivers on the road today, fatalities have dropped because of safety equipment like the seat belt.
- 6. BONUS 77 Sunset Strip. Stu Bailey (Efrem Zimbalist Jr.) and Jeff Spencer (Roger Smith) were the wisecracking, womanizing private detective heroes of this Warner Brothers drama which aired from 1958 to 1964. And don't forget about Kookie (Edd Byrnes).
