Congratulations all on a good Spring Fling Show on the 5^{th} . We had fewer car registrations but a good time was had by Details to follow.



We received the donation of a 1924 Model T Doctor's Coupe without strings attached. Cross Church Car Show was also a success although a smaller success than 2020. A nice variety of cars attended with the same silver and blue "56 Nomad being honored as last year. Thank you to those involved volunteering to Keep 'er Movin.

Since April 29th is our last general meeting for the summer, I am requesting that the Membership approve a motion to waive the general membership approval of purchases over \$1,500 and allow the equipment committee to purchase equipment exceeding that amount if approved by a board motion. These purchases would be made by recommendation of the equipment committee with an online board vote for approval so the checkbook isn't just being opened for whatever is desired. The shop management team currently has a wish list but that is not saying that we have an immediate need or will purchase all or any of these items.

Last spring, we did the same with a maximum spend down to a \$15,000 reserve. We spent less than\$20,000 getting the shop in service. The take away message here is we need at least 41 members to attend the meeting in order to have a quorum and validate the vote.

We will be making a proposal to RCSC for a few things to be added to their 2023 budget including HVAC for the shops, an extension of the mezzanine area for an upholstery shop, a more effective and complete cover for the big shop compressor. We would also like to have some better monitor station cabinets made which will match the other cabinets in the "Donut Zone". We will also be considering a heavier duty lift which will be large enough and strong enough to lift a one-ton truck with dual rear wheels. The HVAC and mezzanine size was in the original requests when RCSC solicited input for the new shop but neither made it through to the bid specs.

Thank you to all who have been participating in the monitor program. We have many new faces in the club and it is great to see you all, even if I don't remember your names. Because of the above we have gone from having trouble filling particularly afternoon slots to being able to be open the majority of the time.

Besides the 26th (a date change) general meeting, there are events coming which could benefit from your attendance.

Featured Wheels

1957 Chevy Les Litzenberger



A funny thing happened on the way home... That is how so many tales of this type start and so it was with Les's 57 Chevy. He never really had to have this particular car but it was for sale in his neighbor's yard in the Pasco Washington area. So every day he would drive by the Chevy and think that would be a cool car but already had too many projects. One day in 2011 at a car show Connie asked the neighbor/owner who was showing another hot rod if he still had the car. Why yes he still had it and it was still for sale. So Les and a buddy put it up on a lift to have a look. And what would an old car be if it didn't have a touch of rust to give it the "proper patina". But it also had a running 283 and a four speed that operated just fine. After the appropriate amount of haggling a deal was had and the car, as shown below followed Les home (and left a trail of oil just in case he had to retrace his route).

For the next 3 to 4 years Les tinkered around the edges of the car and drove it around Washington State. Then in 2014 Les and Connie moved to Sun City and parked the Chevy in a friend's (Dave Ruble) barn. At the time he asked Dave (a car builder with many projects in the works) if he could recommend someone to take the car to the next level. Dave was a bit



offended Les didn't ask him to do it although Les finally realized his mistake and asked Dave to take on the project.

In February of 2015 Dave and Les started the heavy lifting with the thought that it may need a little "scuffing and painting". Certainly a few gaskets or bushings here and there "might" also be required. And so the story began looking like this:



As we all know what starts out as a small project can sometimes expand to a larger one. As they dug deeper into the car they discovered fiberglass where metal once was including in some structural areas. Fiberglass motor mounts? Why not!

So they decided to go deep and put the car up on a rotisserie as shown belo

It was then they discovered a few missing pieces which, luckily could be ordered. And what could not be ordered could be fabricated. Les also discovered that Coil springs improperly removed can pack quite a wallop. Fortunately, he did not need to order any new "body parts" for his arm.



Over the course of 10 months Les, Connie, Dave and his family, including grandson Calvin,





restored the body and chassis and installed a Fresh 5.3L Chevrolet LC9 E-Rod Crate engine with 4L60E transmission. The engine proved to be too big for the engine bay so the bay was "enlarged" (Cut, weld, grind, repeat) to provide enough space. Les also decided to replace the rear bumper with one from a Nomad so the license plate is mounted on the bumper itself.

Originally, Les was thinking about a two tone cream color for paint but then saw a 1965 Impala in a blue color called Iridium. The color is used on the Nissan Infinity and became his color of choice. Dave did the spraying, one of only four cars he has done. The matching interior was done by Brad Tobler of Sun City Upholstery. As anyone who has seen the 57 Chevy knows the

finished product looks great and Les and Connie only show the car in and around Sun City. Check it out!








Les graciously provided an image of all the different body styles the 1957 Bel Air came in.



Ingredients

- 2 oz. rice vermicelli
- 8 rice wrappers (8.5 inch)
- 8 large cooked shrimp, peeled, deveined and cut in half
- 1 1/3 Tablespoon chopped fresh Thai basil
- 3 Tablespoons chopped fresh mint leaves
- 3 Tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
- 2 leaves lettuce, chopped
- 4 teaspoons fish sauce
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 Tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 Tablespoons white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic chili sauce
- 3 Tablespoons hoisin sauce
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped peanuts

Directions

Bring a medium saucepan of water to boil. Boil rice vermicelli 3 to 5 minutes, or until al dente, and drain.

Fill a large bowl with warm water. Dip one wrapper into the hot water for 1 second to soften. Lay wrapper flat. In a row across the center, place 2 shrimp halves, a handful of vermicelli, basil, mint, cilantro and lettuce, leaving about 2 inches uncovered on each side. Fold uncovered sides inward, then tightly roll the wrapper, beginning at the end with the lettuce. Repeat with remaining ingredients.

In a small bowl, mix the fish sauce, water, lime juice, garlic, sugar and chili sauce.

In another small bowl, mix the hoisin sauce and peanuts.

Serve rolled spring rolls with the fish sauce and hoisin sauce mixtures.
